Parish Life Together in the New Year

Dear Friends,

anuary is traditionally the time of year when resolutions are made to change the trajectory of our lives. Studies repeatedly demonstrate that, like most diets we undertake, the needle moves very little. Could part of the reason for that

lack of progress be that we tend to skip the admittedly painful step of wrestling with why we need a course correction? I have always maintained that criticism is not an inherently bad thing if two factors are in place: the first is that the criticism is offered from a position of knowledge, experience or wisdom, and the second is that the criticism comes from a place of love.

There is a lot to like about our parish and our life together. It is precisely because of that overall health that now is an appropriate time to reflect on where we might be coming up a little short or missing a ministry opportunity. The Vestry will be meeting on a day-long retreat at the end of the month with a trained consultant to take stock of where we are and, with my retirement on the horizon, how God would have us look toward the rest of 2025 and beyond. I am grateful that the Rev. Janettarose Greene will continue her ministry as Associate and that the Rev. Victoria Heard has agreed to increase her position to half-time through June 30th of this year. In addition, the Vestry is currently interviewing two candidates for the position of Interim Rector to begin in early

May. We also have a search committee, ably chaired by Mike Whatley, looking for an additional ordained leader to join our team. We are getting closer to calling a Finance Manager so our staff is in solid shape. I am so grateful to Janet Tasker for returning to her position and filling in while this search is underway. I am also grateful that the

Vestry has elected Gordon Thomas to join

David Mayhood and Suzanne Stroup as Trustees of the parish, filling Peg Marsh's spot with her move to North Carolina. (Each parish in the Diocese of Virginia has three Trustees who are entrusted with holding the legal title to properties on behalf of the Bishop. For our parish they also form a majority of the

In other words, we are doing what we need to do. That said, however, where are areas of our common life that could be strengthened or revitalized?

Board of our St. Mary's Foundation.)

I have a couple of thoughts. With the leadership of parishioner Rosanna Esposito, we are looking at how visitors and new members are welcomed and grafted into the life of our community. Maybe you have experiences or ideas that could help continue the building of beloved community for all of us. Maybe you would like to invest some sweat equity in turning it into reality. Likewise, the outpouring of love and prayer for Henry Hotra and his family after his injury (he is making steady progress, God be praised) reminds us that pastoral care is not only the responsibility of all of us in an emergency (not just the clergy) but an ongoing

need in all our lives. Transportation, meals, prayers, companionship are things taken for granted, until they're no longer in place or readily available. How do we ensure that we stay connected and supported?

The Foundation for Belonging classes set for four Sundays beginning in January are not only meant for persons wanting to join the Episcopal Church through baptism or confirmation when Bishop Harris visits in February. Anyone who wants to step back and again ask how best to serve God and the world as a disciple of Jesus might find this small investment of

time useful before plunging ahead with a new resolution to improve themselves.

No one ever gets it completely right. No parish ever gets it completely right. But if the journey together is marked by faithfulness and hard work, it is remarkable the fruit that the Holy Spirit yields in and through us.

May the Peace of the Lord always be with you.

ATTEND THIS YEAR'S MISSION TRIP

I am considering several devotional programs that help me go deeper into scripture, so feel free to ask me about how it's going, and let us hold each other accountable!

I offer you a prayer for New Year's, based on a prayer by Traci Smith in "Faithful Families for Advent and Christmas."

Gracious God, the year changes, but God's love stays the same. We wonder what might happen this year, in our world, in our community, and within our church. We wonder how we might grow more connected to you, God, and to one another. We wonder if we have it in us to start a new faith practice or jumpstart an old one this year. No matter what this new year brings, one thing will be true: God will be with us each and every day. We start the new year with joy and hope, wrapped in your love and strengthened by our faith. Amen.







MUSIC NOTES

Eve of Epiphany Feast of Lights Sunday, January 5, 5:00 pm

St. Mary's Youth and St. Mary's Choir will lead this joyful conclusion to the Christmas season. The drama of the Epiphany will be re-enacted through readings, carols and with the colorful costuming of the Three Kings in procession. A reception will follow.



Candlemas Choral Eucharist Sunday, February 2, 5:00 pm

Candlemas is a Christian feast day that celebrates the presentation of Jesus in the Temple of Jerusalem. It is celebrated on February 2, 40 days after Christmas, and is also known as a festival of light with the blessing of candles. The Nunc Dimittis (the canticle sung at Choral Evensong), comes from when Simeon's wish was fulfilled when he met the Messiah in the temple. (Luke 2:25-38).

Hymn for Epiphany Hymn No. 788 (Wonder, Love & Praise) As newborn stars were stirred to song

This hymn was commissioned by the San Francisco Chapter of the American Guild of Organists in 1995. The text by Carl Daw contains examples about great moments of song throughout scripture. The winning tune in a competition was written by John Karl Hirten and named for his wife Alexandra. It is fitting for the season of Epiphany with its reference to stars and the third verse mention of the Word taking flesh, but could be sung at any time of year except Lent.

Hymn No. 788, Vs. 3

When God's redeeming Word took flesh to make salvation sure, unheeding hearts attuned to strife refused love's overture. Yet to the end the song went on; a supper's parting hymn, a psalm intoned on dying lips when sun and hope grew dim.

THE LECTIONARY: YEAR C

Lectionaries intend to provide for the church over a given period (usually three years). Large units of Scripture are arranged according to the seasons of the Christian year and selected because they carry the central message of the Bible. Lectionaries are not designed to limit one's message or restrict the preacher's freedom. On the contrary, denominations that use a lectionary usually hear more Scripture in worship than those that do not. I can attest that preaching from the lectionary stretches me into areas of reflection and action more than if I had been left to preach only from my personal preferences.

Our lectionary is an ordered system for reading the Holy Scriptures at the Eucharist and the Daily Offices. The Book of Common Prayer (BCP) contains two lectionaries: The eucharistic lectionary (BCP, pgs. 887 – 931) and the Daily Office lectionary (BCP, pgs. 933-1001). The Prayer Book lectionary is based on the lectionary developed in the Roman Catholic Church following Vatican II.

The BCP lectionary uses a three-year cycle called Years A, B, and C. We are currently in Year C, which began on the First Sunday of Advent. The Daily Office lectionary follows a two-year cycle. We are currently in Year 1, which also started on the First Sunday of Advent (i.e., preceding the odd-numbered year). In the eucharistic lectionary, the Gospel According to Matthew is read in Year A, Mark in Year B, and Luke in Year C. The Gospel According to John is used during Lent and Easter and on some Sundays in Year B since Mark is shorter than the other.

The Art of Blessing

esterday I went to visit someone in the hospital. As I walked down the hall, I came from behind upon a nurse with beautiful braided grey hair that tumbled down her back like a waterfall. I told her it was beautiful. She was startled, and smiled, and ever so slightly straightened her shoulders. I was intentional. I meant to give her a blessing.

I grew up in a secular house where praise was relatively rare and the conveyed concept of duty was strong. One did well because it was one's duty to do well. Words of praise were rare. Reading C.S. Lewis, I became a Christian as a child - but still lived by the rules of my dutybound family. When I experienced a call to the priesthood, I knew that priests blessed, but I had no idea what that meant. I learned little more in seminary. Of course, I learned the "ABCs" of ordained priests: that they could absolve and bless and consecrate; but I do not recall a single explanation of what a priest was doing by blessing, much less what lay persons were doing beyond expressing gratitude at dinner. I did note that in the South, "Bless his heart," meant a number of things.

I believed what the Church believed, but understood nothing of what I was doing when I, newly ordained, was first asked to 'bless the people'. What could I as a mortal, priest though I was, add to God's blessing of God's creation? I suspected, 'Nothing.'

It was not until some years later that I began to understand that the act of blessing changes things, rather like the actions of Adam of

naming creatures in Creation. God had created the animals and blessed them, but in a subordinate action of co-creation, Adam names the creatures - identifying them.

God made the world good, but then God invites humankind to name what is already made and blessed. When priests and bishops bless, we rearm and name the goodness or beauty or grace of someone or something in creation. It is a benediction, literally from the Latin: we speak out the good. However, non-ordained Christians as part of the priestly people of God do the same thing when they ask God's blessing on their dinner or give their blessing to their children or thank someone who has done them a kindness by saying "Bless you."

Intentionally practicing blessing as a spiritual habit

changes one's perception of the world. I have learned that if I complement someone on a job well done, or hair - I bring a blessing to the action, or to a

person, or name the quiet courtesy I saw offered to another. I find myself more grateful to God that goodness and beauty and grace are still abroad to be seen and named. I see the Holy Spirit breathing on all sorts of human activity. I become more aware that I

am part of the Body of Christ, and as such, I am charged to see, name, and bless goodness or grace or courage when I meet it - as Elizabeth did, when she blessed Mary

(Luke 1:42), or Jesus did when he blessed Peter for discerning the truth (Matthew 16:17).

As the body of Christ, Christians are called to be the priestly people, to name and bless all the goodness, truth, courage, kindness and beauty that they see in the world. Our naming and blessing changes things.

Think of a time when someone named something you did or were. It made you more...yourself, a little happier, or surprised, or glad to be noticed. Priest or people, when we bless or praise, we name and arm the beauty or kindness or justice or truth to a world and people hungry for all those things.

Rev. Dr. McPhee will preach at our 8:00 am and 10:00 am Holy Eucharist services, and Mrs. Sweeting will present on their collaboration and findings during the 9:00 am Forum Hour.

The Reverend Dr. Missouri L. McPhee, MACE, MDiv, DHLit, DMin, BCCC, CPC, CCTP, FT, CDP, HICS a native of Nassau, Bahamas, is an ordained Itinerant Elder in the African Methodist Episcopal ("AME") Church. She serves as the Chair of the Board of Examiners and the Chief Conference Secretary for the Central Annual Conference in the Eleventh Episcopal District of the AME Church. Dr. McPhee also serves as the Secretary for the Eleventh Episcopal District's Board of Christian Education and Administrative Assistant to Presiding Elder Henry L. Postell II and the North Orlando District. She volunteers as the

Chaplain for the Central Florida Council of Boy Scouts of America (BSA) and holds a seat on the Boy Scouts of America National Religious Relations Committee. On July 1, 2022, Dr. McPhee was appointed the Connectional Director of Boy Scouts for the AME Church, making her the first female to hold the position since the Association of African Methodist Episcopal Scouts (AAMES) inception in 1993.

Dr. McPhee is a hospice Chaplain, Board Certified Thanatologist, Board Certified Clinical Chaplain & Pastoral Counselor. She has extensive training in trauma, critical incident stress management (CISM), grief & bereavement, bioethics, end-of-life care, and dementia. She was intricately involved in the Pulse Night Club Shooting (Orlando, FL), rendering bereavement services to the families of the victims as well as to law enforcement in the aftermath. Dr. McPhee is considered a frontline worker, intricately involved in caring for COVID-19 patients, families, and medical and clinical staff.

Additionally, Dr. McPhee coordinates the Faith-filled Families Initiative at Virginia Theological Seminary, Alexandria, VA, a

\$1.25-million-dollar grant initiative from the Lilly Endowment Inc. to research children's spirituality. She is also a guest columnist for The Christian Recorder, The Orlando Sentinel, and Modern Health. Dr. McPhee is the very proud parent of her teenage son, Jacob III, an Eagle Scout and college freshman. They reside in Sanford, FL, with their beloved dog, Hank.

Donna K. Sweeting has dedicated her career to serving the needs of her community through various roles in education, social work, and faith leadership. She serves as Project Director at Virginia Theological Seminary of a 1.25-million-dollar Lilly Endowment Inc. Christian Parenting Grant awarded in 2022 to the Seminary.

Before her work at Virginia Theological Seminary, Donna served as Parish Administrator at the Historic St James Episcopal Church in Baltimore, Maryland. She played a critical role

Donna has held leadership positions at several non-profit organizations. Community Mediation of Maryland, guiding parties through an informed process to identify issues and generate resolutions. Additionally, she served as CEO of DS Connections, Inc., where she directed a team of case managers who assisted persons in the community diagnosed with mental illness.

Donna was the Director of several Christian preschool programs and Director of Youth Ministry for Mt Olive African Methodist Episcopal Church in Orlando, Florida. She now serves as Director of Children's Ministry and Executive Assistant to the Pastor at her church, Wayman African Methodist Episcopal Church, in Baltimore, Maryland. She was part of the design committee for creating the Big Way of Love for Kids, a formation resource for children and their beloved communities created by the Episcopal Church. Donna currently serves on the Equity Audit Committee for the Godly Play Foundation.

Donna holds a BA in Criminal Justice from the University of Florida and an MA in Practical Theology from Virginia Theological Seminary. She is married to Attorney James Sweeting, III, and is the mother of two sons and two daughters. She is also a proud grandmother to Bowie, Cairo, and James V.

Throughout her career, Donna has remained a steadfast advocate for children, mental health awareness, and trauma-informed care within religious settings, embodying a deep commitment to improving the lives of others through compassion and community service.





What are vespers? Vespers are the early evening office of prayer in the church. The term "vespers" is from the Latin word for "evening." Lucernarium (lamp or lamp-lighting time) was an early name for vespers. The practice of Evening prayer dates from the third century. It is mentioned by Tertullian and in the Apostolic Tradition of Hippolytus. During the fourth to sixth centuries, evening service took the form of vespers. Vespers has also been called the evening sacrifice of prayer.


